Field Trip Report: Nature in the City, North and West Vacaville Neighborhoods

Unexpected intermittent rain did not stop twenty nature lovers from enjoying Nature in the City, the first of many weekday neighborhood walks planned by the Napa-Solano Audubon Society. The outing began at the home of the trip leader whose yard has been certified by the National Wildlife Federation as a Backyard Natural Habitat. The yard has been planted with native and Mediterranean climate plants for the express purpose of attracting wildlife – especially birds and butterflies. Techniques for planning and selecting plants for a wildlife-friendly garden were explained and examples shown.

The group began their bird sightings by identifying a number of small passerine (perching) birds that were at the feeders in the yard. Birds seen included Lesser and American Goldfinch, White-breasted Nuthatch, Oak Titmouse, Golden and White-crowned Sparrows, and Anna's Hummingbirds. During a minute of silence

<u>**DESTINATION LOCATION:**</u> Rush Ranch, 9:00 am. From Hwy I-80 in Fairfield, take Hwy 12 exit east toward Suisun City. Proceed east 4.2 miles; turn right (south) onto Grizzly Island Road. Proceed 2.4 miles. Rush Ranch is on the right.

This area is operated by the Solano County Open Space District, offers trails into the surrounding tidal marsh, managed wetlands and rolling hills. These hills are especially good place to find raptors. Dress in layers, wear appropriate hiking boots and bring water and snacks. Rain cancels.

DESTINATION TIME AND LOCATION:

Newell Open Space, American Canyon; 9 AM

These windswept hills of American Canyon offer possibliities for various raptor species, as well as other winter birds. Trails are rugged and if wet could be muddy and slippery. Wear sturdy hiking boots and dress in layers appropriate to weather. A half-day hike up and down hills. Carry water and snacks.

<u>MEETING PLACE:</u> Lena's Cafe (great hamburgers) off Highway 29. Turn east on Napa Junction Road (turning lane if approaching from north) near RailRoad overpass. Drive approximately 100 yards. Ample parking.

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the group listened to the calls of Western Scrub Jays, Northern Flicker, and Black Phoebe. Some in the group caught a glimpse of a Hermit Thrush while most had a good look at a Spotted Towhee, a ground feeding bird with bright red eyes.

Strolling through the neighborhood located in extreme northwest Vacaville the group spotted American Crow, Turkey Vulture, Northern Mockingbird. Along the way Acorn Woodpeckers called their nasal 'whacka- whacka' and flashed over showing their white wing patches and undulating flight pattern. Stopping at a fence line overlooking an old apricot drying and packing barn, a well-illuminated flock of five Western Bluebirds was observed at the top of a young walnut tree. A Red-tailed Hawk shrieked its call and was spotted at the top of a conifer. In the mid-distance a male California Quail stood guard at the top of a brushy pile while a small flock of Bushtits flitted in a nearby hedgerow.

The group then relocated to a bike and walking trail along Alamo Creek on the west side of Vacaville between California Drive and the Twin Oaks Community Center. After posing for a photo in front of a large Valley Oak the group paused on a pedestrian bridge spanning the deep cut creek. We listened to the plaintive song of the Golden-crowned Sparrow and viewed the remnant riparian (along a waterway) habitat. The habitat included Fremont Cottonwood, Valley Oak, native grapevine, pipe vine (a critical plant for the Pipe vine Swallowtail butterfly), elderberry (no longhorn elderberry beetles were

seen), and dense thickets of poison oak. We avoided the poison oak but picked and crushed pungent Bay Laurel leaves and inhaled the fragrance of the aptly named anise plant. The only new bird seen was the House Finch but we could have seen Yellow-rumped Warblers, California Towhees, Bewick's Wren, Great Blue Herons, Snowy and Great Egrets. We searched the hillsides for raptors but the normally seen Redshouldered and Cooper's Hawks were hunting elsewhere. Even the 'guaranteed' sighting of an American Kestrel was not to be on this showery day.

The final stop began at the Buck Mansion in downtown Vacaville and the group perambulated down Buck/Main Street past turn of the 19th-20th Century Victorian mansions and 'kit houses'. Some of the group were staff and volunteers from the University of California Davis Arboretum and they shared their expertise by pointing out the major trees along the walk including 50' tall Southern Magnolias, three kinds of palms – 'fat-trunked' California Fan Palms, 'skinny-trunked' Mexican Fan Palms, and 'feathery-fronded' Canary Island Palms. We walked under Coastal Redwoods, Deodora Cedars, Big-leafed Maples, Camphor Trees, ...Ray Ash, and Ginkgoes. We stopped and admired a sculpture called Pear Harvest consisting of life-sized bronzes of a young girl and her father picking pears from the ground and from a pear tree.

We quickened our pace as the clouds darkened again, and

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entered the Ulatis Creek Walk in downtown Vacaville. This is a series of walkways, pedestrian bridges, and promenades on the floor of Ulatis Creek twenty feet below the surface of the surrounding downtown. It passes through a remnant riparian habitat, and is guarded by large Fremont Cottonwoods, Coast Redwoods, California Buckeyes and is patrolled by a Belted Kingfisher, who like many birds expected to be seen, was in fact neither seen, nor heard. It began to rain heavily so we sheltered under the old arched concrete Highway 40 bridge and decided to end the walk without exploring the remainder of the Creek Walk.

Fourteen of the group then gathered for a wonderful no-host lunch at the Old Post Office Restaurant on Main Street in Vacaville where we enjoyed selections such as crab cakes, polenta, trout, a fantastic seafood medley, and eggplant sandwiches; some enjoyed the taste of a local Wooden Valley chardonnay. As lunch ended the clouds began to clear away and sunshine eventually returned.

Although the bird list was limited, the day was very successful as we enjoyed each other's companionship on the walk and at lunch, as we experienced Nature in its myriad ramifications in the City.
