Benicia Christmas Bird Count Become a Citizen Scientist!

Would you like to be part of the citizen science effort? No special background is needed to sign up for the December 14, 2009, 63rd Annual Benicia Christmas Bird Count (BCBC). There are many ways to participate: help count the number of birds and species seen in the area on a group hike; in a motorized boat, or canoe or kayak; by car; or from the comfort of your home at your bird feeder. If you love to cook, help by providing the birders with some hot entrées at the end of the day. Or, if you have an artistic bent, help set up and decorate tables.

The idea for a Christmas count germinated in an unlikely way in 1900 when hunters gathered at Christmas to see how many birds they could shoot in one day. Ornithologist Frank Chapman (1864-1945) proposed seeing how many birds could be counted, rather than shot-thus was born the modern Christmas count. Today groups throughout the country count within a 15-mile diameter circle during a 24-hour period between December 14 - January 5. The Benicia count, initiated in 1930 by resident Emerson Stoner, became an NSAS-sponsored citizen science project in 1971. Last year, 86 birders and 4 bird feeder watchers counted 172 species and 89,005 birds! The Benicia CBC ranked in a tie for 31st place, out of 2,124 count circles in North America (based on number of species seen). Best of all, in 2008 the Benicia CBC found the highest numbers of Virginia rails (84) and was tied for the most black rails (3). NSAS Habitat Project Wins Environmental Award

NSAS president Cheryl Harris was recently awarded the Environmental Award by the Napa Chapter of the American Red Cross for NSAS' **Together Green** project: "Habitat Restoration on Vineyards, Ag Lands and Beyond." Launched in fall 2008, the project educates people about and demonstrates the importance of reestablishing diverse native vegetation and wildlife corridors on or near agricultural and other open space lands, for the benefit of birds, other wildlife and our community at large.

NSAS received a grant from *Together Green*, a program of National Audubon, with funding support from Toyota. Accomplishments this first year include:

• More than 150 bird boxes were constructed, then later installed in vineyards and other agricultural areas, Land Trust and open space properties by volunteer work parties—boy scouts, girl scouts, residents of the Yountville Veterans Home, and others.

• NSAS presented 5 workshops on various Habitat Restoration topics for the Ag community.

• NSAS members gave a number of community presentations on habitat preservation and restoration.

• Planning, design and installation of local demonstration hedgerows has begun.

Projects planned for spring 2010 include <u>hands-on</u> habitat improvements—removal of invasive weeds, planting native plants, and installing bird boxes, interpretive signs and demonstration hedgerows. Many thanks to those of you who have already given your time and energy to help make this **project a success!**

Rare Western Sighting

Was it a Greater Ringed Daup—or perhaps a Ring-Necked Scau-Duck? Whatever it was, on Friday, November 13, birders on the NSAS Friday bird walk at Lake Hennessey were treated to the sight of a bird rarely seen in the West—a hybrid of a male Ring-necked Duck and Greater Scaup, thanks to the sharp eyes of Murray Berner. This bird was first seen here in December 2006 and has since returned each fall. Although duck hybrids are relatively common—almost any combination of species can produce live young—there are only one or two previous reports of this hybrid in North America, and none previous in the West. **Another good reason to join the Friday morning bird walks!**

Important Bird Areas (IBAs) in California

In Napa and the San Francisco Bay Area, we have an abundance of beautiful areas to explore: rivers, the bay, the ocean, an extensive river delta, the Mojave Desert, and the Sierra Nevada mountains. NSAS schedules trips that take us to see an extraordinary number and variety of bird species, especially those nearby areas designated by the National Audubon Society as Important Bird Areas (IBAs).

Audubon California has used the best science to identify and map the 145 IBAs in the state, which provide more than 10 million acres of essential habitat for breeding, wintering and migrating birds. Part of an international effort, these sites were nominated by local experts and selected according to strict criteria:

- Support over 1% of the global or 10% of the state population of 1 or more sensitive species
- Support more than 9 sensitive bird species
- 10,000 or more observable shorebirds in one day
- 5,000 or more observable waterfowl in one day

This special program provided in conjunction with the 45th Annual Angwin Christmas Bird Count on New Year's Day—will teach students and their parents the basics of bird watching as well as how to become a "Citizen Scientist." NSAS and the St Helena Library are co-sponsoring this event, with funding support from a *Together Green Volunteer Days* grant -- from National Audubon Society and Toyota. The count circle, with a diameter of 15 miles, includes St Helena, Angwin, Lake Hennessey and part of Lake Berryessa. Audubon volunteers are needed to help with the 12/30/09 and 1/1/10 events.

The Farallons 40 Years Later

Forty years ago, when Point Reyes Bird Observatory (PRBO) established the Farallon Island Research Station, Ron LeValley was a young biologist who had volunteered as a bird bander for a number of years. Ron will share experiences he has had on the islands, discussing the changes that have taken place on the island and in the Farallon ecosystems, using his own photographs to illustrate his talk.

Ron LeValley, a nature photographer and former biologist for the PRBO, is a founding member of the Mendocino Coast Photographer Guild and Gallery. Founder of consulting firm Mad River Biologists in Eureka, California, Ron is best known for the identification and distribution of birds along the Pacific Coast. He is also associate editor of the journal Western Birds.

Pelagic Birds of the Central California Coast

Tuesday, February 9, 2010 ~ 7:00pm

Seabirds on the ocean thrill birders with their acrobatic exhibitions. Just offshore from the Monterey Peninsula in California a 'trench' plunges to 6,000', providing a cold-water upwelling rich in nutrients supporting unusually abundant food for seabirds. This slideshow program will familiarize attendees with fall bird migration patterns in the area and provide information about taking a pelagic trip in Monterey. *NSAS members Tom McNicholas and Alan Moore are the presenters.*

CARPOOL LOCATIONS: <u>Cordelia</u>: Solano County Office of Education parking lot (5100 Business Center Drive, Fairfield) near Costco. <u>Vallejo</u>: Old Wal-Mart parking lot across from Baskin-Robbins (5182 Sonoma Blvd.). From Sonoma Blvd., turn east at the Meadows Drive traffic light. <u>Napa</u>: Riverpark Shopping Center; by Sweeney's Sports,, 1537 W. Imola Avenue, between Coombs and Jefferson St.

Check the details for the specific trip to see which carpool locations will be used for that trip. The Carpool times listed are **departure** times. Please arrive early. Finally, carpoolers will share driving expenses. The recommended rate of reimbursement to the driver is 30 cents per mile, to be split by the Number of riders, excluding the driver.

Benicia Christmas Count Preview

Saturday, December 12, 2009

LEADER: Robin Leong

DESTINATION LOCATION: Benicia Christmas Count Circle [the center of the Benicia count is on Highway 680, approximately 1.5 miles north of Pierce Lane.]

TRIP INFORMATION: Robin Leong is this year's Christmas Count chairman. Pre-count can be done for 3 days consecutive days before count day and post-count is done for 3 days after count day (Dec. 12). We will be checking out various areas in the count circle, adding birds we may not see on count day. Bring a lunch.

Post Angwin Christmas Bird Count

Sunday, January 3, 2010

LEADER: Murray Berner

DESTINATION LOCATION: Various locations in the Angwin Christmas Bird Count.

TRIP INFORMATION: Following the New Year's Day Angwin Christmas Bird Count, we will seek out the rare or uncommon birds found during the count, and perhaps add one or two "count week" birds to the total. We'll visit St. Helena hot spots such as the Beringer Ponds, where Barrow's Goldeneye is often present, as well as the wastewater treatment plant on Chaix Lane. Other possible destinations include Lake Hennessey for Northern Pygmy-Owl and Red-necked Grebe, Los Posadas State Forest for Pygmy Nuthatch, and Sage Canyon for who-knowswhat. Carpooling is essential for this trip, which involves many short stops at various locations. Bring a lunch.

CARPOOL LOCATION AND TIME: Leave from Napa carpool loc. at 8:00am. The field trip will end by 2:00pm.
