### **Meet Our New Education Coordinator!**



Crystal DeMarco has joined Napa-Solano Audubon as our new Education Coordinator, and we are fortunate to have found her. Crystal has a degree in Environmental Studies with over nine years of related experience working for California State Parks, Balboa Park in San Diego, and as an assistant teacher in Sonoma. Before Crystal joined us, she led environmental education programs at the State Parks, Tijuana River National Estuarine Research Reserve, and later managed twelve botanical gardens in San Diego's Balboa Park, including the rose garden, butterfly garden, park nursery, and 320 acres of landscaping around the park.

In the short time she has been our Education Coordinator, Crystal has presented to over 225 students at nine elementary classrooms in Napa and American Canyon. She has led our beginning bird walks twice a month and is helping to organize the Christmas Bird Count 4 Kids in December. She will also be starting up our Junior Audubon program again in January.

Our Education Chair, Eric McKee, says that Crystal is a huge part of the Napa-Solano Audubon's operations. "Already this year Crystal has provided leadership training to 10 high school youths involved in the Napa Youth Stewardship Council. These teens went on to lead Western bluebird education activities with 1,000 youths at Connolly Ranch Harvest Festival. The teen leaders painted faces with colorful birds, and helped install several bluebird nesting boxes on the farm. Crystal will continue to work with high school teens throughout the year, engaging students in bird watching and monitoring, bluebird and barn owl box installations, leadership training, and career mentorship."

Crystal's goal going forward is to share her love of birds with others and open more children's eyes to the world of birds and wildlife. Crystal lives in Sonoma with her husband and son. If you see her at one of our events or on a beginning bird walk, please welcome her to our chapter.

## **NEST BOX PROJECT Continued Success**

Our nest box monitoring for the 2017 season was a huge success. Over 30 volunteers monitored 149 of boxes spread across both Napa and Solano Counties. Special thanks go out to Jeff Bonneville - Napa County Coordinator and Earl Swenerton, Solano Land Trust - Solano County Coordinator.

In Napa County, 65 of boxes were monitored at eight different sites, resulting in a total of 66 Western Bluebirds and 54 Tree Swallows fledging. Trail monitors that made it happen included Holly, Anita, and Alan Jessop, Pat Hildreth, Deborah Villa Dash, Laurie Puzo, Allison Nagel and the Girl Scouts, American Canyon High Students, and New Tech High School students.

Many of our volunteers also participated in Solano Land Trust's Nest Box monitoring in Solano County. In this program, 84 of the boxes were monitored, resulting in a total of 111 Western Bluebirds and 122 Tree Swallows fledging. ### **Birds of Paraguay** Tuesday, January 9, 7 pm

From the dry Chaco in the west to the Atlantic rainforests of the east, Paraguay will soon be on the map for international birders. John Sterling was the team leader that developed a curriculum for training birding guides in Paraguay for the National Audubon Society and the Inter-American Development Bank. He was able to bird with several of the graduates of the Advanced Training Course. John will talk about the new opportunities for birding ecotourism and will illustrate his talk with some of his photos taken on this trip.

John Sterling is a wildlife biologist and consultant whose clients include The Nature Conservancy, National Audubon Society, Center for Natural Lands Management, CA Dept of Water Resources, Kern Water Bank and the Smithsonian Institution. He was a former staff avian ecologist at the Smithsonian Migratory Bird Center. John has been a diehard birder since 1971 and loves teaching his identification workshops and leading his international tours.

# Tropical and Local Hummingbirds

Tuesday, February 13, 7 pm

Manfred Kusch, a retired professor from UC Davis, has lived the past 25 years along the south bank of Putah Creek. He has developed part of his property into a private bird preserve and garden that includes a large riparian woodland, which attracts many birds including Calliope, Rufous, and Black-chinned Hummingbirds. The UC Davis School of Veterinary Medicine has conducted a health and conservation banding project in his garden for the past seven years.

Kusch will discuss the hummingbird health banding program as well as show photos of both local and tropical hummingbirds viewed throughout his travels in South America.

## **Conservation Advocacy**

Science-based advocacy is a useful tool. If you are interested in attending a local advocacy training in December, please email me at napiotrowski@yahoo.

com. I will be holding a daytime event in December and making arrangements as needed to do smaller in-house trainings if there is interest. The goal will be learning how to use letter writing and district meetings to effect change.

As an update, state-wide efforts to advocate on behalf of birds and their environment resulted in some wins. Bills passed and signed included Senate Bill (SB) 50 – Federal Lands

Conveyance, SB 51 – Federal Whistle Blower Protections, SB 249 – Off Highway Vehicle Reform, SB 615 – Salton Sea 10-year Plan, and Assembly Bill 109 – Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund investments in wetlands. The SB5 - Parks Bond also passed and will result in a June 2018 ballot measure. We will have more information as we get closer to that date.

Also noteworthy is that SB 49 - Clean Air, Water, Workers Defense Act did not pass. SB49, 50, and 51 were thought of as a "green shield" for California. Essentially, in the event that federal environmental

and protection standards are weakened, this was to be a back-up to protect California. SB49 specifically was written to prohibit a state or local agency from amending or revising its rules to be less stringent than the federal baseline standards pertaining to environmental protection. Given that this did not pass this session, further efforts will be needed to protect the environmental status of our state should the federal standards weaken.
